## Year 1 - Painting and Mixed Media: Colour Splash



Rationale: Pupils who are secure will be able to:

- Name the primary colours.
- Explore coloured materials to mix secondary colours.
- Mix primary colours to make secondary colours.
- Apply paint consistently to their printing materials to achieve a print.
- Use a range of colours when printing.
- Mix five different shades of a secondary colour.
- Decorate their hands using a variety of patterns.
- Mix secondary colours with confidence to paint a plate.
- Describe their finished plates.

Learning Objectives:

- To develop a wide range of art and design techniques in using colour, pattern, texture, line, shape, form and space
- To use drawing, painting and sculpture to develop and share their ideas, experiences and imagination
- To use a range of materials creatively to design and make products
- To use drawing, painting and sculpture to develop and share their ideas, experiences and imagination
- about the work of a range of artists, craft makers and designers, describing the differences and similarities between different practices and disciplines, and making links to their own work

- Plasticine or play dough in: red, yellow and blue - two balls of each per child Crayons and coloured pencils $\bullet$ Coloured tissue or cellophane in primary colours $\bullet$ Paper or sketchbooks • A paint palette • Red, yellow and blue ready-mixed paint • A piece of A3 paper (mid to heavy quality) • A selection of coloured bricks or other small classroom objects in red, yellow and blue $\bullet$ Ready-mixed primary paints in palettes/plates - one per pair of pupils • Palettes - one per pupil • Water pots $\bullet$ Brushes (a range of sizes) • Protective aprons/shirts • Paper or plastic on the tables • A3 off-white sugar paper (per child) • Pencils • Chalks or marker pens for outlining numbers • Lots of Lego or Duplo blocks • Other objects suitable to print with eg cotton reels, corks, building blocks etc • Scrap paper or sketchbooks for experimenting • Loose paper for printmaking $\bullet$ Ready mixed paint • A small collection of green objects, natural or man-made - leaves, fruit, vegetables, plastics, packaging etc. - Paper plates -1 per child with some spare


## Impact/Assessment

Most Children will: • Naming the primary colours and exploring coloured materials to mix secondary colours. • Remembering the primary/secondary colours and how to mix primary colours to make secondary colours. • Using a range of colours when printing, being able to apply paint consistently to achieve a print. - Being able to mix five different shades of a secondary colour. Using a variety of patterns to decorate their hands. - Mixing secondary colours with confidence and describing and comparing their finished plates.
More Able Children will: • Knowing how the secondary colours are made, and making them using different materials. • Applying paint thickly to create texture and achieving a balance of colour in their paintings. - Creating designs that indicate deliberate pattern and/or colour choices. - Being able to reflect on their work and talk about how they might mix a lighter or darker shade of a secondary colour. Painting patterns with some control. $\bullet$ Being able to make considered decisions about their choice of colours; mixing secondary colours confidently and showing some independence in their organisation and choice of painting equipment.
