Children enjoy carrying out small tasks for a trusted adult.

Children are beginning to be confident in new social situations – they are making friends with the new children in the class.

Children are more outgoing with new adults in the classroom, including trusted school visitors.

Children will play with one or more children. They elaborate on ideas and become immersed in their play.

Not on track – children will be able to read set 1 sounds and complete Word Time 1, 2, 3, 4, 5.

On track - children will read set 1 sounds speedily and complete Word Time 6, 7. Set 2 sounds – ay, ee, igh, ow, oo, oo. a variety of situations.

Children can explain the meaning of their new vocabulary.

Children are able to write short phrases and sentences with a little support.
